

ELENA'S STORY

Elena*, a 34 years old Romanian woman, has recently exited sexual exploitation. Elena was exploited since the age of 15 when she was manipulated and coerced by her partner and his parents to practice forced prostitution in Romania and abroad. For years Elena tried to escape this abusive relationship and create a safer environment for her and her daughters, but was unsuccessful as the trafficker leveraged control of their children in order to manipulate her to stay. After finally managing to escape the trafficker and his family, Elena called the police to report the abuse. Partners in the police reached out to IJM and asked for support with the case. Elena and her daughters were provided secure **shelter** in one of the projects of Next Steps, away from the abuser and his family. Next Steps collaborated with law enforcement in order to ensure Elena that evidence was heard and an investigation was started, also to secure potential future arrests of perpetrators.

Since May 2022, Elena has received social assistance, psychological counselling, legal assistance and is developing sewing skills with the purpose of finding a workplace. In October 2022 Elena was employed as social worker at the project of Next Steps helping with offering assistance to the other victims, and she is now involved in a sewing project. The Next Steps project is proven beneficiary for Elena and her daughters.

Main Achievements

Challenges & Learnings

Prevention activities

We organized prevention activities that reached more people then targeted for 2022. Through the 25 Awareness and Prevention Campaigns 1.010 people were reached. We developed creative prevention materials that can be used for future Awareness Raising Campaigns.

Next Steps presented among professionals

More than 100 care professionals from various chain partners in the Netherlands have been informed about the existence and offer of Next Steps. The possibility of referrals was used several times by these organisations: several women have been referred to us for help. Next Steps also received several requests for advice.

The conferences

The five conferences helped to develop a strong network that is needed for case referrals. Professionals from law enforcement, prosecutors, judicial officials, embassy representatives and professionals and students from Law, Social Sciences and Political Sciences were trained in subjects related to fighting human trafficking.

The number of cases that received support

The number of supported cases at Betania, Salvation Army or through referrals of IJM to partners is higher than indicators set for 2022. This is probably because the strong networks developed through this Next Steps program.

Start of sewing atelier

Next Steps started a sewing atelier in Oradea to offer alternative work also to women who want to get out of prostitution. The Salvation Army has several Second-hand shops (Reshare) in the Netherlands. It was agreed that we offer the sewing products from the sewing atelier in the Reshare shops. Sample products have also been sent from the Netherlands to Romania, so that the products match the demand in the Netherlands. The ultimate goal of the sewing workshop is, that the women who participate can get a salary, by selling the products at Reshare. Meanwhile, the first products have been sold in the Netherlands.

Refugees could be supported immediately

As funds were made available to support Next Steps, refugees could be supported immeditately in this unexpected/new intervention. In the summer EO Metterdaad portrayed Next Steps coordinator Cristina on TV; this increased the funding.



Main Achievements Challenges & Learnings

Covid-19 related challenges for staff and beneficiaries

Several people from the staff were on sick leave because of Covid-19, which delayed activities. Many of the beneficiaries were infected with Covid-19, those were offered food packages at the door and counselling by phone. Covid-19 affected the number of participants at activities and group meetings in especially the first part of 2022.

Staff capacity

It is challenging to find competent staff, and to invest in development of staff to prepare them to work with victims of human trafficking.

War between Russia and Ukraine

With Russia's Invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 and the subsequent high flow of refugees transitting or settling in Romania, Next Steps adapted an implementation plan and activities.

As of beginning 2023, 14 million Ukrainians have been displaced from their homes. Of these, 7,9 million have left Ukraine for destinations other than Russia, primarily Poland, Romania, and Moldova. This group is comprised of 90% women and children. Many of these are hoping to obtain protected refugee status in Western European countries. Unfortunately, the countries along Ukraine's western borders, through which they must transit, are known hubs for criminal trafficking networks. These women and children represent vulnerable victims for the criminal enterprises which have redoubled their recruitment efforts to prey on distressed migrant populations. Hence, Trafficking in Human Beings (THB) and Gender-Based Violence (GBV) have been identified as two of the most important protection and safeguarding risks associated with the Ukraine Refugee Crisis. Therefore, we have been in dialogue with authorities to develop a model of protection to support increasingly vulnerable populations. Early-stage interventions included:

Emergency Aid – we respond to needs identified by partners to provide food, medicine, financial support, beds, washing machines, and SIM cards. Protection Officers also intervene to resolve critical cases requiring specialized social and/or medical services.

Transport – we have transported and facilitated safe transport for refugees traveling from inside Ukraine to initial safe partner organizations. We implemented safety measures and supported onward journeys for refugees to western destinations. Guidance and implementation has also included safe travel preparation for backup of traveling documents, safe numbers and support persons in final destinations.

Safeguarding – we have guided partner organizations in developing their own safeguarding protocols, to ensure staff and volunteers do not represent a potential threat to the refugee populations.

Trafficking Awareness – In collaboration with the Government of Romania, we have developed materials highlighting the signs of trafficking, and disseminated this information at the border, in shelters and churches and through the community.

Training – we have delivered and sponsored training on trauma-informed care for partner organizations and local churches.

Progress & Achievements

The Next Steps project is built on three major pillars. In the following pages, we explain our progress on each pillar within the project.

PILLARS

1

Offering perspective to recovery & access to aftercare

The expertise to implement and develop step-out programs for victims of human trafficking and sexual exploitation, and reduce vulnerability through access to **economic opportunities** such as **skills development**, **vocational training**, **employment** or **entrepreneurship** that would help to build a new future and access to an improved financial situation.

Justice System Transformation

We want to work with law enforcement through building capacity within the government to be able to address human trafficking in a sustainable way and working towards structural and sustainable approaches to prevent human trafficking and sexual exploitation.

3

Addressing root causes via prevention and reducing vulnerability

Expertise in prevention programming and targeting self-esteem and building empowerment among vulnerable groups. Raising awareness on human trafficking and sexual exploitation among vulnerable groups and professionals.



Offering direct assistance to victims of human trafficking we, alongside partners, have offered support to twelve victims of trafficking. Victims that were supported are young women residing in the north and east side of Romania, who were recruited in Romania and trafficked both internally and to other countries of destination such as Italy and the UK. We had the opportunity to support survivors of cross-border trafficking and accompany them through the criminal justice process, while using casework as a diagnostic tool to identify gaps in prosecution and victim support. These learnings will, in turn, inform capacity building initiatives.

Participating in the conference "Inter-institutional collaboration in the fight against human trafficking" organized by Next Steps in Oradea. The event took 3 days, and it had different targeted audience from students and specialists in the field of Law, Public Administration to policemen from different departments. The topics covered were: "the approach based on the understanding of trauma" and "Physical protection of the victim of human trafficking".

New beneficiaries joined through outreach in Bucharest and referrals. Since April, the shelter in Oradea offers housing for both victims of human trafficking and refugees.

During the past year, we have made significant progress towards project activities of engaging law enforcement and understanding the training needs of criminal justice system actors, supporting victims of trafficking and promoting collaborative casework. The progress that was achieved was done through the following:

The "Building a Collaborative Criminal Justice Response to Trafficking in Persons in Romania" Conference. We organized this National Conference, in collaboration with Government of Romania partners. The conference brought together law enforcement, prosecution and judicial officials, practitioners and embassy representatives with the purpose of showcasing good practice models and strengthening collaboration among criminal justice systems actors in Romania and abroad.

The two-day conference hosted speakers from national and international criminal justice system entities. The focus was on sharing best practices and identifying key areas for improvements in collaborative casework, including

cross-border issues. Professional security representatives gave presentations on the importance of financial investigations and accountability and victim-centered response in cases of trafficking in persons. The conference also included a dedicated session on good practice models of Romanian-Dutch cross-border collaboration with Romanian and Dutch prosecutors presenting together.

Working collaboratively with partners and law enforcement. We have supported law enforcement and partner NGOs in multiple cases. The support stemmed from legal services, to safeguarding of victims and mentorship on collaborative casework. This is significant as it allows for trauma-informed approach to be applied and survivors to be protected against re-traumatization.

The conference entitled "Responding to The Ukrainian Refugee Crisis with A Safe And Educated Approach That Helps Prevent Human Trafficking" took place in November. The aim of the conference was to facilitate communication between state institutions and NGOs, as well as spreading information related to the prevention of human trafficking among Ukrainian citizens. During the meeting, various topics were addressed around prevention and psychological effects of human trafficking. At the end of the conference, new connections between the organizations were successfully established, as well as opening up and discussing legal and assistance issues for Ukrainian



Time and energy has been invested several activities organised in Romania for training and courses on various subjects.

- 1. Training on developing safety nets during one of the activities for women and teenagers for a group of refugees. During this training, the refugees discussed safety related issues and integration in Romania.
- 2. **Vocational training courses** as a prevention activity.
- 3.**'Life Skills trainings'** were given at Youth Camps and Youth programs.

- 4. Sewing courses and developing additional life skills were organised for teenagers from a vulnerable community.
- 5. **Workshops on awareness and prevention** were given by one of our teams.
- 6. Performing and presenting sketches on the subject of human trafficking on high schools and the local conference. Students and teachers were involved in preparing the play.

Next Steps in the Netherlands

We visited 21 partner NGOs, the police in three regions and nine care coordinators in nine regions. In these visits the work of Next Steps was explained, and collaboration was promoted. We received 5 requests for advice from those different partners and attended 6 network meetings where we were asked to share about the work of Next Steps. Currently there are three Romanian, two Hungarian and one Bulgarian in the Next Steps caseload.

Next Steps was able to meet with police officers and other experts in the Netherlands to discuss the trafficking situation. We organised a joint workshop to IJM staff; this strengthened the collaboration of Next Steps.

In Romania and the Netherlands coordination meetings took place. A new coordinator was appointed, she was able to visit one of our partners in Oradea in June and December. They were supported in the start of the emergency response for Ukrainian refugees.

Looking into 2023

Evaluation

Next Steps will conduct an evaluation to validate the impact of this project and collaboration. As well as looking into future perspective: "what would Next Steps look like after 2023?". Because of the lower expenditures (explained in 'Main Achievements, Challenges & Learnings') it is possible to extend the project till December '23, this will give time to work out the findings of the evaluation.

Writing


